

2022-2023 SCHOOL YEAR IMPACT REPORT

This report highlights the vital work you made possible in 2022-2023. Because of you, students in Bellevue's public schools benefitted from valuable programs such as access to mental health support, new books for inclusive libraries, and continued groundbreaking computer science learning. With your support, students went to preschool regardless of their family's income, and teachers received funds for their own national certification as well as funding for special arts and innovation projects. TRANSFORMING EDUCATION. SUPPORTING STUDENTS.



In December 2021, the US Surgeon General issued a public health advisory warning of a youth mental health crisis. Thanks to your support, the Bellevue School District was ready to respond proactively. School counselors provided mental health screenings for **7,108** students. **29%** of middle and high school students reported anxiety or depressive symptoms and **17%** reported ideas of selfharm. Counselors worked with over **90** students to develop safety plans, and over **551** students received therapy with a counselor. Students' progress was monitored to make course corrections and to determine if the intervention was successful. **95%** of students reported an increase in coping skills. Many students were in crisis – thank you for extending a life line to them this year.

Computer Science

This year, your investment in PreK-8 computer science education served 19 elementary schools and 7 middle schools, directly serving 5,960 students. Well over 90% of all races, ethnicities and genders of 4th graders reported they believe all different of people can learn to code and improve in computer science. 89% of 4th grade girls and 93% of boys reported that they can create things with computer science, coding, or technology. In middle school, teachers implemented the integration of computer science into other scientific subjects, such as learning to code robots that can be used to clean coral reefs (computer science in environmental science). Among 6th graders, those indicating they would like to take a computer science class in high school increased from 63% to 71% for boys and from **44% to 53%** for girls. Bellevue School District was one of only four districts in the country to pilot a program with Amazon Future Engineers to teach students to develop technology to protect the planet.

Inclusive Libraries

Bellevue students originate from 125 countries and speak 100 languages – our schools embrace the diversity and experiences they bring. Through literacy, student's personal and academic identity are affirmed and elevated, creating the context for classroom cultures that value one another's humanity with equitable and exceptional education for all. Thanks to our donors, **343** classrooms received classroom library booster packs with a total of **3,771** physical books for 8,028 K-5 students. And, all **11** secondary libraries each received inclusive library sets worth \$1500 for the **11,530** secondary students.

Early Learning

High-quality early education is critical for children's success in school and beyond. With your support, **29** part-day preschoolers who qualify for state Early Childhood Education Assistance Program (ECEAP) were provided financial assistance to attend full school day or extended work day slots. The creative curriculum engaged the young learners in fun activities that develop important cognitive, social-emotional, physical, literacy, language, and mathematics skills. Additionally, **100%** of families surveyed reported access to preschool has improved family self-sufficiency. **95%** of families surveyed reported they have received additional support and/or accessed community/school resources as a result of their child's enrollment in preschool.

This year, you supported **57** teachers who achieved either a new or renewed National Board Certification! Bellevue is one of only four districts in the entire country where over **40%** of teachers have earned this significant achievement. With over 30 years of support for this initiative, we're continuing this legacy of teaching excellence.
