- Students at Newport, Interlake and Bellevue High Schools developed research, organizational, writing and presentation skills critical to college through the 2-year **AP Capstone** course.

Changing Lives

Donor-funded programs transform education and support every student.

Selected 2017-2018 Program Highlights

College & Career Next Steps introduced **11,145** students to college, career and post-secondary education possibilities through 24-hour access to the cloud-based **Naviance** college-planning platform. High school seniors submitted **10,877** college applications through **Naviance**.

Preschool Scholarships gave **20** young children from low-income families or families experiencing homelessness the first step in their educational journeys with seats in a high-quality Bellevue School District preschool classroom.

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) taught **774** middle and high school students college prep study skills to boost academic achievement. **100%** Of AVID seniors applied to college.

National Board Certification, the gold standard of professional development, was achieved by **64** teachers. Another **36** renewed their certification, bringing Bellevue's number of NBC teachers to **542**—#1 in the state.

80 Arts, Enrichment & Innovation Grants were awarded to teachers at **28** schools. A, E & I grants fund in- and out-of classroom projects that bring learning to life for students of all ages and abilities.



Retooling School

“Computer Science changed my outlook on everything!” -Issac, Sherwood Forest Elementary

Issac’s enthusiastic endorsement of computer science was inspired by the District’s **PreK-12 Computer Science and Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math (STEAM) Initiatives**. Funded in part by Bellevue Schools Foundation donors, the programs are re-tooling school and preparing students of all ages to thrive in a future we can’t yet begin to imagine.

Both programs put our schools at the leading edge in the development of district-wide computer science and STEAM education. Their integrated delivery equips students with the ‘new basic’ skills of our technology-driven world—computational thinking, communication, creativity, and collaboration.

Walk through the doors of Cherry Crest Elementary, and you’ll see STEAM education woven into multiple subjects throughout the day. Coding is a tool to solve math problems while preschoolers program Bee-Bots during their literacy periods.

At middle schools, kids make the connection between engineering, technology and the arts with 3-D printers that can design and print kinetic sculptures. And at every level, Makerspace workstations give students space and freedom to make the leap from technology consumers to technology inventors.

Since launching the STEAM and Computer Science Initiatives, enrollment in middle and high school computer science focused classes has risen. So too, has engagement with typically underrepresented populations—girls, special education students, students of color and English language learners.

Donors are preparing students for success in the 21st century marketplace —no matter which field they choose to pursue.

Bellevue Schools Foundation donors have helped address the growing epidemic of teen stress and anxiety with grants that teach middle and high school staff how to weave social and emotional learning into daily classes and activities. As a result, school climate and cultures are becoming more welcoming and empathetic as teachers and staff strive to make sure all students feel safe—physically, mentally and emotionally.

Mindful Moments is one example of this school-wide cultural shift that sets the foundation for empathy, resilience, and self-awareness. Embedded in the SEL curriculum Mindful Moments are 30-60 second daily reflections that allow students to pause and be more present in their learning.

“The mindful moment centers me. When Mrs. Sparks rings the mindfulness bell, we close our eyes and listen to the tone. After the mindful moment, I notice that not only I am calmer, but others seem calmer as well and ready to learn”.—Ryleigh 8th grader at Odle Middle School

Mrs. Spark's mindfulness bell is a reminder that a holistic learning environment which encourages self-awareness and empathy, as well as academics, is an investment with lifelong rewards.

Nurturing Potential

Growing up in the Bellevue School District I have been given lots of opportunities but the Bellevue Schools Foundation has given me opportunities to be my best self. -Izayah Baldauf, Newport High School

Izayah Baldauf is a senior at Newport High School, who's excitedly planning to attend Johnson & Wales University this fall to study Culinary Arts. But, his shiny future didn't always look so bright.

Izayah and his mother moved to Bellevue when he was 7. Soon after settling in at Woodridge Elementary, this self-proclaimed 'tri-racial' young man learned that he was performing below grade level. **Because of the generosity of Bellevue Schools Foundation donors, Izayah received critical supports that have helped him every step of the way.**

Izayah benefited early on from a donor-supported **National Board Certified** teacher, Miss Jan, who was able to keep him engaged and enthusiastic about reading. In fact, by the end of second grade, he made the leap from lagging behind his peers to being one of the top readers in his class,

In middle school, **AVID** (Advancement Via Individual Determination) helped Izayah learn to talk about difficult subjects, organize and set goals. There, he learned to be comfortable asking questions and speaking in front of others without fear. Most importantly, he began to see himself as college-bound.

Naviance—a 24/7 online college and career planning platform—was in place to help Izayah his freshman year of high school. **Naviance** helped him plan his high school path and keep his college requirements, test scores, volunteer opportunities and applications organized with dates and deadlines. It was through **Naviance** that Izayah discovered he could combine his life long love of culinary arts with a college education at Johnson & Wales University.

Last Spring, Izayah spoke at the **Spring for Schools** Luncheon to share his experience and thank donors. After hearing his story, Elaina Herber, a BSF Trustee, contacted him about an internship with Ascend Hospitality. Izayah loved his time at Ascend. It opened his eyes in many ways and confirmed he was on the right path. Most importantly, he discovered one of the secrets to a happy, healthy life "you can have a beautiful thing and love what you are doing ... you can love something and make it your career".

Giving Back

When a local women's book club, **Ladies of the Club**, decided to commemorate their 30th Anniversary, they found a novel way to put philanthropy at the center of the celebration.

Ladies of the Club member Debbie Batjer contacted the Foundation in early fall with a question --how could her club promote literacy and help Bellevue School District students?

After learning how few books in Spanish were available for children in Bellevue's Spanish dual-language elementary schools, the Ladies of the Club decided to honor their history by sharing their love of reading with our students.

Together, they donated more than \$10,000 to purchase books for school libraries at Ardmore Elementary, Lake Hills Elementary, and Sherwood Forest Elementary.

In Spring, the Ladies of the Club visited Lake Hills first graders to see the results of their gift. Students led the bibliophiles on a tour of the library and showed them their impact in action, and paired with Club members to read books in Spanish together.

Said Lake Hills librarian Elizabeth Roberts, **"When I first got here, the kids had read all the Spanish books already...Now they're discovering new things and exploring and they love reading."**

The Foundation is grateful to the Ladies of the Club for sharing their love of books. At the start of the year, only 10% of Lake Hills' library books were in Spanish, while nearly half of Lake Hills' students are in the Spanish dual-language program. Their gift goes a long way towards engendering a love of literacy for students in our dual-language schools.

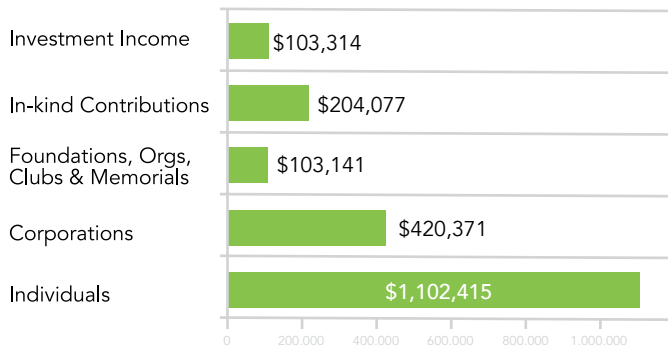

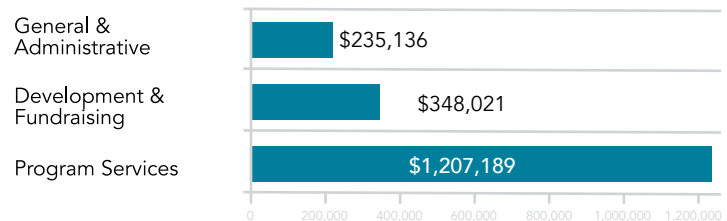

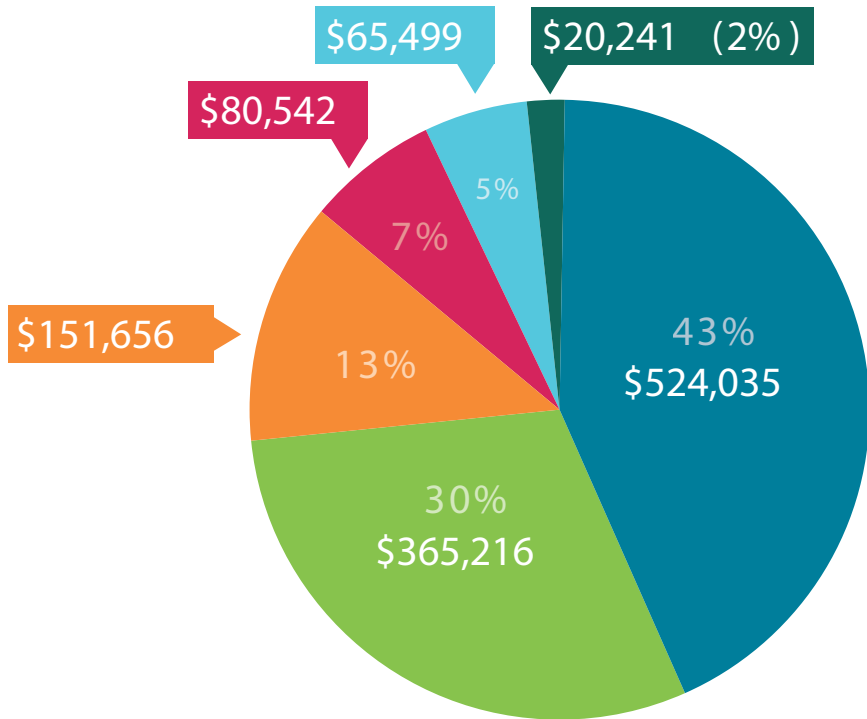
